- Community Service We developed a Statewide Community Service Project, the Comfort Bears, that all Oregon FCE members can participate in. Many other Community Service Projects were developed throughout the state.
- Oregon FCE State Fall Conferences We have developed the best State Conferences that we can. They did and will include great locations, great classes, and great fellowshipping and just overall a great experience for all that attend. A big thank you to all of those in District 2 and District 4 who helped in making the 2018 Oregon FCE Fall Conference a big success. Please read all the contest guidelines and rules on the forms on the Oregon FCE website. Get your Study Group or County recognized for their great Community Service Projects. Fill out the forms correctly and submit them by the deadlines listed.
- Oregon FCE 2nd and 3rd Grade Essay and Art Work Contest – This is a brand-new contest of Oregon. The forms have been emailed out to all County Presidents and all members. The forms are also available on

- the Oregon FCE website. Invite all 2nd and 3rd Graders to compete in this contest. Have them fill out the forms and submit them by the deadlines listed. This year's theme is "What I love most about living in Oregon."
- Volunteer Hours Awards This year was our first year for this award. We had several that were given out at the 2018 Fall Conference. These awards are for individuals, Study Groups or Counties. Take a moment and apply to receive some recognition for all the volunteer work that you do. You all desire it. Forms are located on the Oregon FCE website.

It is time to select your Heart of FCE nomination. This is a wonderful honor for our members to be recognized for their accomplishments. Nominations must be sent to VP for Public Policy, Sandie Bolyard by March 15, 2019. Every county should submit a nomination.

Let your District Director or State officer know so they can present them at the Board of Directors meeting in March 2019. You can also submit your suggestions to VP for Programs, Barbara Voltin.
